## From the Vicarage:

I still find it hard to imagine that, as we shiver and get 'soggy' here in the Forest, our Australian brothers and sisters have been struggling with the challenge of decimating



bush fires, scorching temperatures and strong winds.

The news coverage has been extensive, graphic and heart breaking. However, in 2019 there were a sad number of disasters across the world, many of which had a massive toll on life but seemingly got far less coverage., A serious drought in Southern Africa, Burundi landslides, South Asia floods and the Whakaari/White Island eruption.

There are continued debates about the effects of Global warming on our climate and our world.

There are advocates for change, there are Climate Change deniers. There are those who work hard to make small changes to their lifestyle in the hope of having an impact, and there are those who refuse to make any changes whatsoever. Those who are obsessed with the future and the world their children will inherit, and those who are convinced that nature will sort it out itself.



The temptation, when we are bombarded with campaigns, pleas and appeals is to become numb to it all and, just like me, simply get on with everyday life and hope for the best.

## Climate change and how to help stop it

Way back in the last century we watched science fiction films of our world in 2020. There were two views:

 We would all live in a clean, green, orderly world of blue skies, fresh clean air and no waste problems with sustainable energy. Maybe a bit over controlled in some versions !

Or

2) We would all live in an overpopulated, smog-ridden world with streets full of waste, no green areas or trees in sight, with rehydrated man-made food sachets.

We haven't reached either end of the spectrum yet but we are still damaging our beautiful world, changing our climate and causing multiple problems to our natural environment.

Recently I volunteered to be a Climate Change Ambassador for the WI and also Eco advisor to Christchurch church.

I have received so much information from the Climate Change Coalition (the WI is a founding member) that it has made me realise how big this issue is. Most of the changes we need to make are political and beyond the scope of the individual. However, there is more we can do than you may think, and it's not just about recycling or refusing single –use plastic ( although that very important too).

We can change our world for the better through our wallets.

Here are seven things that can make a difference

- 1) Buy the most ethical this is something I will look at in the next few months.
- 2) Less is more -reducing consumption can save money and the planet.
- 3) Get creative before you recycle -fixing, up-cycling, and re-using.
- 4) Shop pre-loved at flea-markets and charity shops: buy second hand books on line.
- 5) Help sustain your local community shop from local, independent traders
- 6) Shop from co-operatives the Co-operative Society encourages workers to have a say in how the company is run.

7) Look for trusted labels – labels that mean the organisation cares about the environment and workers such as Fairtrade, organic, and vegan.

## Bottles to Bricks



This is a photograph of a 2lt bottle stuffed full of those bits of plastic which would otherwise end up in land fill. Not a fashionable party game but a serious attempt to put non-recyclable plastic to good use. Once full, the bottles are used to create walls and other structures in both this country and overseas.

Once constructed, the walls are encased in concrete thus minimising the need for other building materials. You can find more details on

The bottles are filled with any non-recyclable clean and dry plastic, cut small if necessary, and rammed into the bottle using a wooden spoon handle or any suitable stick. A 2lt bottle should weigh about 1.5kg when full: a 500ml bottle about 500gm. The bottle pictured above took about a week to construct

Full bottles are collected at just a few sites at the moment but a team at Christchurch will arrange to collect and deliver to the site any bottles which the readers of this magazine provide. Look out for arrangements for this in the March magazine.

## Spotlight on Kelly MacAskill

Kelly is the current General Manager of Forest Holidays in Christchurch and with around 100 staff under her command represents a major Forest employer. Kelly manages the site and her staff with considerable skill and over the 3



years that she has been here has initiated several developments which have resulted in a warm and friendly atmosphere throughout the site.

Kelly is originally from South Africa, where both her grandfather and father were involved in the hospitality industry. Her father encouraged her to apply for an apprenticeship with a local hotel group where she learned not just customer service but also law and Human Resources. During her final year as an apprentice she worked at the Kruger National Park. National Parks are dedicated to the animals which come first, last and always. It was forbidden to leave the hotel compound without an armed guard and Kelly often woke up in the mornings to find monkeys at her window. Not everyone appreciated the animals-come-first policy. Most notably, a car manufacturer

which, having set up the site with camera platforms in the trees and ready to start, was told filming must stop as a herd of elephants had arrived. Suggestions that the rangers 'shoo' the animals away was met with a firm refusal. A catastrophic storm which left a 3-



foot mud residue behind, caused the hotel to close for several months and Kelly's apprenticeship came to an abrupt end. Kelly came to the UK with her parents in the early 2000's and shortly afterwards took a job running ski lodges in France and Austria. Once the winter season was over she worked for the same company in Portugal and Spain. Her several years with these lodges led to a job with a small but ambitious self-catering cabin company in Yorkshire. When the company diversified Kelly managed their new venture on Fistral beach in Newquay. Fistral has some of the most consistent waves in the UK and soon Kelly, who had learnt to ski and snowboard in the Alps , was on the water learning to ride the waves. She discovered that standing up on a surf board is not quite the same as standing on a snow board and is a more challenging and sometimes frustrating skill to learn. However, she succeeded and as we all do in life, pushed the limits of her ability. Sometimes she would paddle out to find herself some distance from the shore only to discover that the waves were more challenging than she had realised. It is no wonder that surfing is an extreme sport.

Walking the Forest may be calmer than her previous sports but Kelly loves taking her two rescue boxer dogs on daily walks, interspersed with lengthy hikes around the wider Forest and in the Brecon Beacons. She now knows the Forest so well that even experienced, Forest-born staff will ask for her recommendations.

Born and brought up surrounded by the instability of South African politics, Kelly says that South Africa is a great holiday destination pointing out the glorious weather which encourages outdoor life. Kelly would like to develop a café-culture at Forest Holidays, but agrees that the weather is against this. Often in muddy clothes, always with a welcoming smile and eager to encourage 'locals' to use the facilities, Kelly embraces the relaxed Forest style which enables her to work in an industry she enjoys and balance that with her love of the outdoors

#### **Press Release**

#### Meeting held on 2<sup>nd</sup> December 2019

**Parking at English Bicknor School** The Parish Council continue to pursue various options to find a solution to inconsiderate parking on the bends near the school. The Parish Council are very pleased with a letter which the school has forwarded to all parents, and hope that this will help improve the situation. Meanwhile, an offer has been made by the Dean Archaeological Group to carry out a dig on the Glebe for free, subject to criteria received from the County Archaeologist. Regarding the possibility of zig-zag markings on the highway, the suggestion from County Highways is that these markings be put on Balls Hill, which Councillors feel will not help ease the situation, and in fact could make it worse.

Flashing speed signAll the paperwork has now been completed for the<br/>purchase of a flashing speed sign for Hillersland, to be bought fromCounty Cllr T. Hale's budget.Three locations have been identified and nearby<br/>residents notified.The speed sign will also produce data of all vehicle speeds,<br/>which can be produced as evidence to the police and County Highways.

**Defibrillator** The Parish Council has now been made aware of the steps to be taken when 999 or 112 is called due to a medical emergency. The defibrillator should only be taken from the box if the ambulance service advises, in which case they will give the security code to open the box. The Parish Council have also become aware that the running costs of the defibrillator are greater than originally advised. The pads on the defibrillator – although never used – had to be replaced at a cost of £50 as the ones in the machine were out of date, as were the spare pads which the Parish Council had been given. The battery for the machine has a 4 year life, so will need replacing in 2020 at a cost of £280. The Parish Council discussed taking up a maintenance contract, which the clerk will investigate.

**Highway matters** County Highways have cleared silt from the edges of Redhouse Lane, but unfortunately there is still a considerable amount of silt in the middle of the lane. Some vegetation which was overhanging Junction Hill has been cleared, but there are still areas where vegetation needs cutting back further. Highways are currently costing the price of putting a new pipe across the field at the bottom of Church Hill to prevent flooding. Several drains overflowed during the severe storms in November, so County Highways have been asked to investigate blocked drains along Ross Road. Councillors continue to be concerned at the amount of dead wood in trees and hedges at Chapel Hill and near Sterts Farm, and have asked County Highways to re-visit and re-assess the site.

**Bus service to Lydney** Stagecoach have advised that the old 23 service picked up no more than 2 people each day at Lydney hospital, while they are carrying far more new customers on the new route from Whitecroft. Lydney Dial-a-Ride is providing an alternative link to the hospital (service 777).

**Mr A. J. (Robin) Johnson** The Parish Council were saddened to hear of the death of Mr Johnson, who served as a Parish Councillor between 1987 and 1996. During that time he was vice-chairman of the Parish Council for 5 years, before being elected as chairman in 1993, a role he stepped down from a year later due to illhealth, though he continued to serve as a Parish Councillor until 1996.

**Parish Council meetings in 2020** As usual, Parish Council meetings in 2020 will be held bi-monthly at 7pm on the first Monday evening of the month, starting in February.
